June 26 Dish-to-Pass Brunch: Capital Campaign Halfway Point Celebration and Chili Cook-Off!

Mark your calendar! There will be a combined Sunday service on June 26, at 10:00 a.m., followed by a brunch in the parish hall to celebrate the halfway point of the five-year capital campaign pledge period, which began in March 2014. This parish-wide gathering will be fun for everyone. Our capital campaign chairs, Mindy and Brett Oakes and Susie Backstrom, will explain what has been accomplished so far and share a sneak peek at upcoming work.

The food will be a dish-to-pass with the main course as... chili! All are invited to participate in the preparations for a friendly "chili cook-off" competition. All kinds of chili are welcome: vegetarian, chicken/turkey, vegan, classic, with and without beans, etc. Parishioners not cooking chili are asked to please bring a side dish or a dessert as resources allow. A dish is not required to attend. More information will be forthcoming as we get closer to the event. Hospitality Committee chairs Stephanie Nevels and Mindy Oakes are coordinating.

Early in 2014, St. John's completed a successful capital campaign, which raised approximately \$1 million in donations and pledges to support vital physical infrastructure maintenance needs. Improvements planned included repairing the roof, truss and ceiling repair, exterior painting, garth drainage and foundation repair, stained glass window restoration, repairing the front steps and nearby wrought iron railing, as well as leveling the sidewalk, repairing the interior wall foundation, and replacing windows in the Sunday School room. The capital campaign also established a contingency fund for future capital improvements.

If you joined St. John's since the capital campaign, please consider making a pledge, according to your means, to support the ongoing work. No pledge is too small! To make a capital pledge, please use one of the cards at the back of the church or contact the parish office for assistance.

From The Rev. Barb Schmitz:

Easter Stewardship Initiative Draws to Conclusion

It had been a long time since St. John's parishioners spoke one-on-one with other parishioners about the spiritual aspects of making a formal estimate of annual giving to the church.

During Easter season (which just concluded with the celebration of Pentecost), about a dozen parishioners called on fellow parishioners to invite an increase in pledging amount and/or commitment (moving from giving, to becoming a giver of record, to making a pledge).

Parishioners were encouraged to move toward what is called "the modern tithe": 5% of one's income to one's local church, and 5% to charitable organizations which further the kingdom of God in the community and the world.

Thank you to everyone who responded. If you did not receive a call, don't panic. We plan to do a more comprehensive stewardship initiative in the fall. You may prepare now by considering what percentage of your income you currently give away, and praying about the changes in your life that would come with increased financial commitment.

"Stewardship is not about the budget. It's about your relationship with God."

Parishoner Profile: Matthew Sanaker

I was raised in a number of "non-denominational" Christian churches as a child; we moved every few years and found a new church every time we did. In my late teens I started studying non-religious meditation techniques, but didn't really seek out any other religion. In my twenties and thirties I studied and practiced Zen and Tibetan Buddhism as well as Western Hermeticism, Jewish and Christian Mysticism, along with Yoga and Tai-Chi. The common theme in the parts of my Syncretic faith is to experience the power of the Holy Spirit and to develop a deep and personal relationship with God and with Jesus Christ. It may seem odd to some, but I believe that the experience of embracing other religions and philosophies has deepened that



What drew me to St. John's and why do I keep coming back?

The short answer would be that I was looking for a place where I could pray and commune with God. A place that feels sacred when you walk in, where people have been praying for generations. I also knew that I wanted to attend a church with a liturgical tradition focused on the Eucharist.

The long answer starts in 2012 when I visited China to set up the IT infrastructure for a new office for the company that I work for. I expressed my interest in visiting some Buddhist temples to a few of my colleagues there and asked for some recommendations. Two of my newfound friends were kind enough invite me to the temple that they worship at in Suzhou and another took me to a famous temple in Shanghai. The experiences that I had there were profound. Being in a sacred place where people have been praying for hundreds of years was so deeply peaceful. The yearning to find a place like that, where I could call home, stayed with me when I returned to Ithaca.

Almost a year later, I walked into St. John's just before 8:00 a.m. on the morning of Pentecost. Participating in the Celebration of the Eucharist and receiving communion for the first time in many years that morning, I felt that same sense of deep peace. The combination of speaking in unison with the rest of the congregation, listening to the scripture being read and prayers being said and the culmination of the service being the moment of receiving communion, was what I was looking for. Sharing in that tradition which connects us to Christ himself is to experience the miracle of the Mass. That moment of being in communion is timeless and a paradox, it is a finite moment in which to experience the infinite omnipresence of God.

There are many things that I appreciate about being a member of the community of St. John's and the Episcopal Church, but I would like to highlight a few. I appreciate the long liturgical tradition of the Episcopal Church coupled with a strong commitment to social justice. I really enjoy celebrating the Eucharist in a way that people have been doing for many generations. Yes, the language has been updated over time, but the spirit of the tradition extends back over millennia. It feels really good to be a part of something bigger than myself in that way. Another thing that I appreciate is that the Episcopal Church ordains women as members of the clergy, I like how that may feel more inclusive for my wife and daughters. I also respect how the Episcopal Church has prayerfully considered its position to celebrate same-sex marriages equally with those of opposite-sex couples. I know that for many it is a blessing to feel that the love they feel can be celebrated instead of judged. There seems to me to be a commitment to treat all people with equal respect and dignity, without regard to sex, sexual orientation, race or class. I also feel a very strong affinity for the mission of Loaves and Fishes. I have some friends that have benefitted from both the meals

and the fellowship of the Loaves and Fishes community. I think that it's a wonderful blessing for the greater Ithaca community and an important mission to continue to support. And finally but not least of all, I've found a group of friends here at St. John's to study scripture with, pray with, and to celebrate special life events with, birth, baptism, marriage, and even to celebrate the life of loved ones who have died. I'm very grateful and thank God for all of these things.

Loaves & Fishes and St. John's Parish

Loaves & Fishes (L & F, http://www.loaves.org) was founded in 1983 with the intention of serving the Ithaca community's individuals in need by providing at least one hot meal per day and a safe place to eat and share with others. The intent was to be an ecumenical program that many Ithaca downtown churches would support.

St. John's clergy and supportive parishioners volunteered to be the initial providers, and with the expertise of the original social worker, management and staff, the program became so successful that it only made sense to maintain the facilities at St. John's as the core of the program. Other local churches have continued to provide support and financial assistance.

The program gained strength over the early years to become its own entity as a not-for-profit with financial stability. L & F is now Tompkins County's only community kitchen that is open every week day, except on Thanksgiving Day. It serves three hot lunches and two hot dinners weekly - over 3,000 meals a month. All are welcome.

L & F is financially supported through individual and local business donations, grants and fundraising events. Most of the workers are volunteers from the community, including students from our high schools and colleges. Over the years, L & F has funded several kitchen and parish hall renovations and provided refrigeration units. It also provides a quarterly reimbursement to St. John's to offset some of its utility costs.

St. John's parishioners have been involved in daily feeding chores and have served on the L & F Board of Directors. Today, our Rector and a St. John's parishioner nominated by the Vestry are included as regular board members.

An Advocacy Program was developed several years ago by the L & F Director. The Program offers guests compassionate support and practical help meeting their most basic needs such as housing, employment, transportation, food, safety and health care. Additionally, over 20 social service agencies provide direct outreach to the guests during meal times. One L & F staff member coordinates the program, which includes training and supervising about 12 Volunteer Advocates.

This year, our Mission Committee has been active in exploring new modes of parishioner involvement. A Saturday morning cookie bake has had some success. The objective is for parish volunteers and L & F volunteers to come together to bake cookies for use at St. John's coffee hour and the L & F meal dessert table.

Opportunities continue for St. John's parishioners to become involved by volunteering for kitchen duties, as advocacy representatives or through board service. The need for volunteers is especially critical in late May and summer when college students are away. L & F is always eager to enter into partnerships with St. John's in serving the hungry in Ithaca. Questions about L & F may be directed to the Mission Committee.
