Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin?


Then your light shall break forth like the dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before you, the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard.

The Epistle Reading

1 Corinthians 2:1-16

When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus Christ, and him crucified. And I came to you in weakness and in fear and in much trembling. My speech and my proclamation were not with plausible words of wisdom, but with a demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith might rest not on human wisdom but on the power of God.

Yet among the mature we do speak wisdom, though it is not a wisdom of this age or of the rulers of this age, who are doomed to perish. But we speak God's wisdom, secret and hidden, which God decreed before the ages for our glory. None of the rulers of this age understood this; for if they had, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. But, as it is written,

"What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him"—

these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God. For what human being knows what is truly human except the human spirit that is

within? So also no one comprehends what is truly God's except the Spirit of God. Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit that is from God, so that we may understand the gifts bestowed on us by God. And we speak of these things in words not taught by human wisdom but taught by the Spirit, interpreting spiritual things to those who are spiritual.

Those who are unspiritual do not receive the gifts of God's Spirit, for they are foolishness to them, and they are unable to understand them because they are spiritually discerned. Those who are spiritual discern all things, and they are themselves subject to no one else's scrutiny.

"For who has known the mind of the Lord so as to instruct him?"

But we have the mind of Christ.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew *Glory to you, Lord Christ.*

Jesus said, "You are the salt of the earth; but if salt has lost its taste, how can its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything, but is thrown out and trampled under foot.

Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches others to do the same, will be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven."

I am taking this February as an excuse to highlight some of the wonderful – and often underplayed repertoire written for the organ by Black composers in our preludes and postludes throughout the month. Composers include my own compatriot from England, Samuel Coleridge-Taylor; Pulitzer-prize winning American composer George Walker; composer of the Harlem renaissance William Grant Still; and the incomparable Florence Price (whose bravura music charmed some of you last week... she is a favorite of mine!). This has been an inspiring project for me, and I am keen to share this beautiful music with you over the next few weeks-- please do come and talk to me over coffee if you want to find out more!

SACRED GROUND IS RETURNING TO ST. JOHN'S!

SACRED GROUND is a film-and-readings-based dialogue series on race and racism, grounded in faith. All are invited to experience this foundational small group experience, walking the labryinth of America's history of race and racism that we did not learn as kids, while weaving in threads of family stories, economic class, and political and regional identity.

The 11-part series is built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latinx and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories.

The total cost for the program is <\$40 for two books you will want in your library: *Jesus and the Disinherited* by Howard Thurman (approx. \$15); and *Waking Up White* by Debbie Irving (approx. \$18). Sacred Ground is underwritten so that videos and articles will be provided free of charge.
